

<p>beliefs</p>	<p>n. feeling of certainty that something exists or is true: "All non-violent religious and political beliefs should be respected equally."</p>
<p>custom</p>	<p>n. way of behaving or a belief which has been established for a long time.</p> <p>"In my country, it's the custom for women to get married in white."</p>
<p>economic</p>	<p>adj. relating to trade, industry and money.</p> <p>"Many people immigrate for economic reasons."</p>

<p>emigrate</p>	<p>v. to leave a country permanently and go to live in another one:</p> <p>"Millions of Germans emigrated from Europe to America in the nineteenth century."</p>
<p>equality</p>	<p>n. right of different groups of people to have a similar social position and receive the same treatment.</p> <p>"We should all be treated with equality."</p>
<p>ethnic</p>	<p>adj. person belonging to an ethnic group which is very different from those that are common in western culture.</p>

global village	<p>n. concept that we are all linked together without barriers of race, religion etc. coined in an era of mass human migration, links by communication, transport and media.</p> <p>"We are all part of a vast global village".</p>
immigrate	<p>v. when someone comes to live in a different country.</p> <p>"When did your family immigrate to Spain ?"</p>
nationality	<p>n. the official right to belong to a particular country.</p> <p>"I live in Madrid, but I have Romanian nationality."</p>

political	<p>adj. relating to politics.</p> <p>"We came here as political refugees from Somalia."</p>
prejudice	<p>n. unfair and unreasonable opinion or feeling, especially when formed without enough thought or knowledge.</p> <p>"Racial prejudice is against the law."</p>
respect	<p>n. when you accept that different customs or cultures are different from your own and behave towards them in a way which would not cause offence.</p> <p>"We should always try to respect the customs of any</p>

country we visit.”

tolerance

n. willingness to accept behaviour and beliefs which are different from your own, although you might not agree with or approve of them.
